Switzerland has been a major centre of ethnic Albanian emigration for many years, and the Albanian-speaking community in Switzerland is one of the largest resident ethnic minority groups.

During the main waves of immigration, people settled and in due course formed community and civil society and political organisations. These have often had a strongly nationalist flavour, and have involved themselves in work for the independence of Kosova from Serbia, and in humanitarian relief in the wartime period.

With the approaching independence of Kosova, the main political objective of these people will have been achieved. It is likely that the majority of these people will be content with this achievement, and there may be some potential for a greater level of immigrant return from Switzerland as a result, but some activists in the Diaspora may see this decision as only one step along a road leading to a new and larger Albanian state in the Balkans.

The seminar will discuss these issues, and relate them to the wider issues of the future stability of the southern Balkans, issues explored in the author's new book **The Albanian Question** (IB Tauris, London and New York, 2006).



Professor James Pettifer works in the Defence Academy of the United Kingdom as specialist analyst and adviser on the southern Balkans and neighbouring countries. He was educated at Kings School Worcester, Hertford College, Oxford and the Free University of West Berlin. He has been a senior member of St Anthony's College, Oxford and Visiting Professor at the Institute of Balkan Studies, Thessalonica, and is a Honorary Fellow of Birmingham University, UK.

He is also a well known author and writer and the author of several internationally recognised authoritative works on the region, such as The New Macedonian Question, The Turkish Labyrinth, Blue Guide to Albania and Kosovo, Kosova Express and (with Miranda Vickers), Albania-from Anarchy to a Balkan Identity.

He is a regular broadcaster on the radio and television and writes currently for The World Today, South Slav Journal and other periodicals and academic journals.
